2017 Nicaragua Eye Care Mission Juigalpa, Chontales, Nicaragua

Program Objectives

- Provide free quality eye care services to the poor in Nicaragua.
- Train Nicaraguan Lions to provide basic eye care services without a USA brigade
- Through a series of projects, establish sustainable Eye Care Clinics to continue delivering free services after the medical brigade returns to the USA.
- Build relationships between Nicaragua and USA, especially among Lions Clubs.

Sustainable Free Eye Care Services

Objective: The Hopeful Ways Eye Care Mission promotes sustainable free eye care services for the Nicaraguan poor with minimal to no support from outside Nicaragua, through training for Nicaragua Lions Club members, loans of ophthalmic instruments, surgery funding, and a coalition with FONIPRECE (a Nicaraguan non-profit eye surgery clinic).

- Developed the capacity for independent Nicaragua Lion Eye Care Brigades
 - Hopeful Ways
 - Loaned ophthalmic instruments to Lions Clubs for brigade usage
 - Trained Lions on all required brigade functions
 - Provides surgical medications & supplies thru donations and fundraising
 - Camoapa and Juigalpa Lions Clubs
 - Organize small brigades to provide free eye care services to the poor.
 - FONIPRECE
 - Participate in a Nicaragua Lions small eye care brigades.
- Established a coalition to deliver free eye care surgeries to the poor in Nicaragua.
 - Hopeful Ways
 - Organize / support eye care missions in Nicaragua
 - Identify surgical candidates for Regional Hospital and FONIPRECE
 - Raise funds to cover surgical expenses incurred by FONIPRECE
 - Nicaragua Lions Clubs
 - Support Hopeful Ways Mission projects in Nicaragua.
 - Coordinate patients at for surgical evaluation by FONIPRECE
 - Refer patients to Regional Hospitals for surgical evaluation
 - Coordinate patients scheduled for surgery at FONIPRECE
 - Organize a small eye care brigades without a USA-based medical brigade present by using Nicaraguan Lions and volunteer medical staff.
 - FONIPRECE Non-profit Eye Surgery Clinic
 - Evaluate surgical candidates identified by Hopeful Ways and Lions
 - Provide surgery (cataracts, strabismus) at cost with free medical labor.
 - Regional Hospitals
 - Evaluate surgical candidates identified by Hopeful Ways and Lions
 - Provide free minor eye surgeries (pterygium, etc.)

Goodwill Activities

- Hopeful Ways donated medications and surgical supplies from excess inventories to FONIPRECE Clinic to use on surgical patients identified during the Eye Care Projects.
- Hopeful Ways delivered donated medical supplies to the Juigalpa Regional Hospital for the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) to improve health care for premature birth babies and breast feeding mothers.
- A Hopeful Ways volunteer delivered donated baseball equipment to fully equip a Juigalpa baseball team, bats, balls, gloves, catcher's gear, hats, and helmets.
- All children entering the clinic received a small toy to comfort them and keep them entertained during their long wait for clinic services.
- Hopeful Ways volunteers distributed toys to children in an extremely poor roadside rural community. It was like Christmas morning for the children.

Dear Lions,

Our vision screening project is underway! It will launch starting with a 3-5 minute presentation to the school board at their meeting this Monday, February 27, at the High School's Professional Development Room. The meeting starts at 7:30pm. The benefits of our free screening will be highlighted with a brief show-and-tell of the screener itself. It would be great if we had several Lions members there as support for



the project.

The actual screenings will take place starting at Sidway on Monday, March 6, at 9:30am. 22 classes will be screened. Two or three trained Lions will operate the screeners with the opportunity for our interested club members to learn the process and to assist at the screenings. Your duties will include ensuring the children are lined up correctly because their data will have been previously entered into the screeners. The screenings will take place in each classroom and should take no longer than 30 minutes per class to complete. All screenings should be completed by early afternoon around 2:30 pm.

The second set of screenings will take place at Kaegebein on Wednesday, March 8, at 9:30 am. Only second grade kids will be screened. Then Huth Road second-graders will be screened starting at 11:00 am. We will need 1 or 2 volunteers to assist at these two schools.

If you would like to volunteer at the screenings, please let me know as soon as possible. Even if you cannot stay all day, even a few hours will be of immense help and you will save sight!

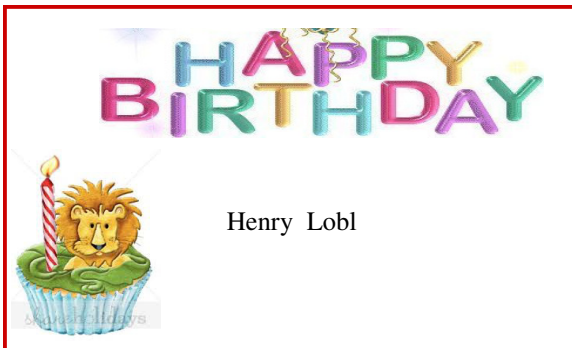
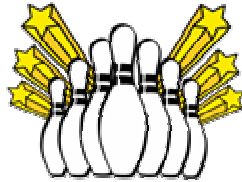
