2010-2011 Budget Information

The Grand Island Board of Education at its regular meeting on April 12th formally adopted the 2010-11 Proposed District Budget. The budget plan totals \$51,881,233. In addition to the budget and school board election, a **Transportation Proposition** will be on the May 18th ballot. The Transportation Proposition would replace seven school buses, two pickup trucks with snow plows and one lawn tractor.

Of the maximum \$767,700 budgeted to purchase these replacement buses, 74% is funded with state aid. If approved by District voters, the Transportation Proposition <u>would not</u> increase taxes in the 2010-11 school district budget.



Ballot Information

BUDGET

Shall the Board of Education of the Grand Island Central School District appropriate the sum of \$51,881,233 for the 2010-2011 school budget as published?

PROPOSITION I

Shall the Board of Education of the Grand Island Central School District (a) acquire various school buses and vehicles, and to expend therefore an amount not to exceed \$767,700.00; (b) that a tax is hereby voted in the amount of not to exceed \$767,700.00 to finance such cost, such tax to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as shall be determined by said Board of Education; (c) that the District is authorized to issue serial bonds to finance all or part of said cost, and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said bonds as the same shall become due and payable; and (d) that, in lieu of bonds, the District is authorized to enter into one or more installment purchase contracts for the purchase of some or all of said buses and vehicles, for a term of not to exceed five (5) years; and a tax is hereby voted to pay each installment on any such contract.

Elect two (2) members to the Board of Education. Donna Tomkins, Neil Seaman, Paul Krull, Thomas Franz.

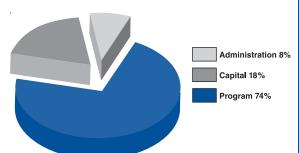

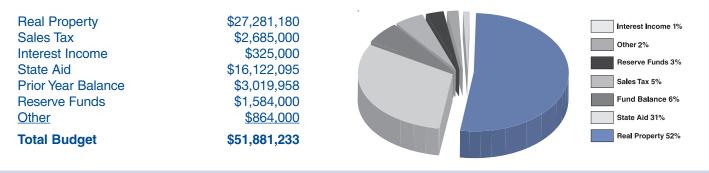

- Summer reading and writing programs.

What Happens If The Proposed Budget Is Not Approved?

If the district voters do not approve the proposed budget for 2010-2011, the Board of Education, by law, must select one of the following options \sim

- A. Remain on a contingency budget;
- B. Present the proposed budget to district voters a second time; or
- C. Make changes to the proposed budget and present a revised budget to district voters.

A contingent budget requires a board of education to be responsible for determining ordinary contingent expenses.

Some of these expenses include:

- Legal obligations.
- Items necessary to maintain the educational program of the district, including teacher's salaries, athletics, textbooks, field trips and other extracurricular activities.
- Transportation for K-12 students, children with disabilities (up to 50 miles) and extracurricular activities.
- Items that preserve the District's property.
- Items that assure the health and safety of students and staff.

Some expenses that would NOT be considered ordinary contingent expenses (and would not be included in a contingent budget) include:

- New equipment, such as school buses.
- Public use of school buildings and grounds except where there is no cost to the District.
- Nonessential maintenance.
- Capital expenditures, except in an emergency.

Statement of Assumptions in projecting a contingency budget for the 2010-2011 school year, should the proposed budget be defeated: *The Contingent Budget is calculated using the NYS contingent budget formula which excludes non-contingent budget items. A contingent budget for the 2010-2011 school year would result in a decrease of approximately \$29,250 from the proposed budget. In addition, a contingency budget would require the district to charge for the use of facilities and reductions in the summer school budget.
