hanks to a grant from the Grand Island Foundation, the Kaegebein Library Media Center (LMC) has 25 USB keys that students may borrow for overnight use when working on research projects. The keys will be equipped with bar codes and will be checked out of the LMC just as if they were books.

A student can take one home, work on the research project using resources provided by the Grand Island Central School District, and save her/his work. The next day, the information should be transferred to the student's

home folder and deleted from the key, which should be promptly returned to the LMC so that it will be available for another student to use.



In addition to solving the problem of

how to save work that students do at home, this program will, hopefully, make the community more aware of the wide array of resources that the district provides to students.

Recently the voters of Erie County elected as its County Executive a person who, according to the polls, was believed could bring a business perspective to the running of a government organization. Those of us in education are always interested first in understanding and then in applying those business beliefs and practices that could help us do an even better job with our business of educating students.

One of the most important tenants of becoming a successful business is to treat your customers with respect. Without a customer service mindset, no business will last very long. School Security Cameras Go Cutting Edge

This fall the Grand Island Central School District began to replace our old analog surveillance system with a new digital video system that ties directly to the school's network. The new system provides a crisp, clear, color image and allows for easy access and monitoring by administrators.

A total of 20 cameras were installed in the Middle School and High School. The cost is approximately \$1,000 per camera depending on model and specifications. Funding for the project came from a grant secured by Assemblyman Hoyt and state aided hardware money. Middle School Principal, Mr. Bruce Benson reports discipline referrals have decreased since the cameras have been installed.

Looking ahead, we will continue to focus on phasing in more security cameras across the district. Phase two of the project will include additional cameras in the academic wing of the Ransom Road complex. Exterior cameras will be a priority in future phases followed by elementary buildings and transportation.

Digital video surveillance is an important component for securing schools and maintaining a productive learning environment. Recent events in the world have caused every school to re-examine its security practices. Maintaining safe and secure schools in Grand Island is a priority.

Huth Road Elementary Reinforces Viking Values



t the beginning of the school year Huth Road Elementary School implemented a new program called Character Counts. Overall it would reinforce the current Viking Values that are "Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Safe". Each month a character trait is concentrated on such as respect, citizenship, fairness, trustworthiness, just to name a few. These topics will be discussed in the classroom, on the bus, on the morning announcements and at the town meetings that are held each month in the auditorium. During this time, children will have the opportunity to learn more about the character trait by reading books, viewing a short video that models the trait and writing about the topic in the classroom. Each teacher then selects and writes about one student in their class that models the character trait the best. The 22 students get their picture taken and it is displayed on our Character Counts Wall of Honor. This program is off to a great start and the modeled positive behavior is catching on very fast throughout our school and home for all of the students that attend Huth Road Elementary school.

Meet the AIS Team



A cademic Intervention Services (AIS) provides additional instruction and/or student support services which supplement instruction provided in the general curriculum and assist students in meeting the state learning standards. Academic Intervention Services are intended to assist students who are at risk of not achieving the state learning standards in English language arts, mathematics, social studies and/or science, or who are at risk of not gaining the knowledge and skills needed to meet or exceed designated performance levels on state assessments. All students are afforded appropriate and targeted opportunities for academic assistance and intervention. Identification of students who are at-risk for learning is based upon multiple measures.

This year, the AIS team collaborated to revise and refine the AIS plan for the Grand Island Central School District. This plan will be recommended for adoption to the Board of Education in June 2008.

The AIS team is comprised of 18 District employees led by Dr. Karen Karmazin, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum. Reading Recovery Works at Sidway Elementary

This year marks the first year of the Grand Island Central School District's commitment to Reading Recovery. Reading Recovery is a highly effective short-term intervention of one-to-one tutoring specifically for first-grade students. The intervention is most effective when it is available to all students who need it and is used as a supplement to good classroom teaching. It is used in many school districts within the country and around the world. Students who qualify for the intervention program work with a Reading Recovery teacher every day. The goal of Reading Recovery is to provide short term early intervention to reduce the need for additional support in reading and writing.

Attention Residents of Grand Island with Children Ages Newborn – 5 Years of Age:

To effectively plan for the 2008-2009 school year, we would like to know how many children reside on Grand Island who are eligible for Kindergarten enrollment in September 2008. Any child who will reach their fifth birthday on or before December 1, 2008 is eligible to attend Kindergarten next school year. Please call the District Office at 773-8819 between the hours of 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and give your name, your child's name, child's date of birth, address and telephone number.

We ask that you call even if you do not plan on sending your child to Kindergarten next year or plan on sending your child to a private or parochial school. This will assist our transportation department, state and federal funding.

We would also appreciate calls from parents/guardians of children ages newborn to 4 years of age residing on Grand Island for future enrollment projections.
